Meet Harriet Servis, PVP Village Member and Dedicated Volunteer and Now, our Newest Board Member



How fortunate the Palos Verdes Peninsula Village is to welcome as a new Board Member, Harriet Servis. Harriet grew up in Quincy, IL, the middle child in her family. It is said that middle children are often excellent communicators, have great interpersonal relationship skills and are very empathetic, a

characterization that certainly depicts Harriet. Being wedged between an older brother and a younger sister qualified her as a peacemaker with significant mediation skills within her family. What prodigious skills to enhance the PVP Village Board of Directors.

Harriet attended Western Illinois University and began a career as an elementary school teacher in Long Beach, CA in 1961. Married to Ken in 1968, they raised their three children in the home where they currently live in Rolling Hills Estates. Though parenting was a full-time commitment, Harriet found time to volunteer as President of the Board of Directors of the Palos Verdes Hills Cooperative Nursery School and President of Friends of the Peninsula Symphony Association.

In 1983, Harriet began a career at USC where she was President of the USC Staff Retirement Association along with Program Chair of the USC Emeriti Center Board.

The Servis' first grandchild in 2000 inspired retirement. Ten teenage grandchildren later, Harriet and Ken's life is rich and rewarding. They are charter members of the PVP Village and extraordinary volunteers, providing rides for members and planning and hosting events. During the fall, Harriet helped facilitate the Guided Autobiography Class. Based on a previous class she organized with USC Master's student, Grace Lebreque, the workshop was extremely well received, and its success was easily attributed to Harriet's incredible contribution.

Harriet's retirement philosophy is to keep physically active through walking, hiking locally, deep water conditioning exercise classes, eating sensibly and maintaining long-term friendships and family ties. Add to the list her dedication to the PVP Village, about which she expresses enthusiastically, "The PVP Village has provided a wealth of socialization opportunities for both of us to meet new people in the Peninsula community and give back through volunteering. Keeping our mind and body active is a bonus we both receive through Village membership."

"LET ME TELL YOU A STORY" 2019 GUIDED AUTOBIOGRAPHY

For six weeks in October and November, nine PVP Village members met weekly to write and share stories about their lives. They were helped along by PVP Village facilitators Harriet Servis, Judy Bayer and Steve Jordan—all of whom had participated in the same workshop two years ago. Each week the group was given a topic (branching points in your life, family, career, etc.) to write about. The next week they shared what they had written with each other in small groups.

"The driving force behind doing this work came largely from our experiences growing up. We all wish we knew more about our grandparents, parents, aunts, uncles and other family members

but never asked when we had the chance. Nothing ever got written down and now they are gone. This will be something I can share with my family now and hopefully years from now after I am gone." Simply put, a legacy.

Two repeated comments at the start of the course were "I don't know how to write" and "I don't have much of a story to tell". Such concerns were quickly proven wrong. In fact, at the completion of the six weeks, there was enough interest in continuing to write that we will be forming a PVP Village writing group in the spring. And, the Guided Autobiography class will be offered again in 2020.

Of Community Interest

The Key to Communication About the PVP Village

Important elections are coming up in 2020, and cities on the Peninsula have consolidated their election dates and activities with the County of Los Angeles, including elections on March 3rd that will include the Presidential Primary, Los Angeles County Supervisors, State Representatives, judges, and ballot measures to mention a few. Voters will be going to the polls in November to vote for President, city council, and other matters. There will be much on which to be educated and informed throughout the year.

One measure that may impact all of us, including many of us with children and grandchildren attending Peninsula Schools is the School Facilities Improvement Measure that will be on the **March 3, 2020 Ballot**:

Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District - Measure PV: To repair aging Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District sites; improve campus safety/security systems; make seismic, roofing, plumbing, electrical, air conditioning, and disabled student access improvements; update/replace bathrooms, classrooms, and science labs that support students for college/career readiness. Shall the Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District measure authorizing \$389,385,000 in bonds, at legal rates, be adopted?

The Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District Board unanimously authorized placement of Measure PV on the March ballot. The PVPUSD's 18 schools were constructed at least 60 years ago, and repair and restoration are urgently needed.

In Loving Memory

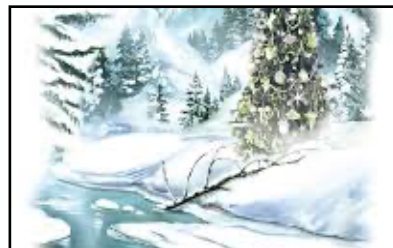
